Protect Yourself from Email Phishing Scams By Harry Woodstrom (Webmaster)

In today's digital age, email phishing remains one of the most prevalent and dangerous cyber threats. Phishing attacks involve cybercriminals sending deceptive emails to trick recipients into revealing sensitive information, such as passwords, credit card numbers, or personal details. These attacks can have severe consequences, including identity theft, financial loss, and unauthorized access to personal or corporate accounts.

Understanding Phishing Tactics

Phishing emails have evolved significantly over the years. Early phishing attempts were often easy to spot due to poor grammar, generic greetings, and suspicious links. However, modern phishing attacks are much more sophisticated. Cybercriminals now use advanced techniques to make their emails appear legitimate and trustworthy. Here are some common tactics used in phishing attacks:

Spoofed Email Addresses: Attackers often disguise their email addresses to make them look like they come from a trusted source, such as a bank, a comrade, or a well-known company.

Urgent or Threatening Language: Phishing emails often create a sense of urgency or fear, urging recipients to act quickly to avoid negative consequences. **Personalized Content**: Cybercriminals may use information gathered from social media or other sources to personalize their emails, making them more convincing.

Malicious Links and Attachments: Phishing emails often contain links to fake websites or attachments infected with malware. Clicking on these links or opening these attachments can compromise your device and data.

How to Recognize Phishing Emails

To protect yourself from phishing attacks, it's essential to know how to recognize suspicious emails. Here are some tips to help you identify phishing attempts:

Check the Sender's Email Address: Look closely at the sender's email address. If it looks suspicious or doesn't match the Legion's official domain (LegionPost164KatyTX.org), it could be a phishing attempt.

Beware of Urgent Requests: Be cautious of emails that create a sense of urgency or pressure you to take immediate action.

Look for Generic Greetings: Phishing emails often use your name and a sent by name that you will recognize. Be sure the check the actual Sent By email address.

Hover Over Links: Before clicking on any links, hover your mouse over them to see the actual URL. If the URL looks suspicious or doesn't match the legitimate website, do not click on it.

Verify with the Source: If you receive an email that seems suspicious, contact the person directly using a known and trusted method to verify its authenticity.

What to Do If You Suspect a Phishing Email

If you receive an email that you suspect is a phishing attempt, follow these steps:

Do Not Click on Links or Open Attachments: Avoid clicking on any links or opening attachments in the suspicious email.

Report the Email:

Forward phishing emails to the Anti-Phishing Working Group at reportphishing@apwg.org2.

Mark phishing messages as SPAM or JUNK Mail.

Report the phishing attempt to the FTC at ReportFraud.ftc.gov

Report the phishing email to your email provider.

Delete the Email: After reporting the email, delete it from your inbox to prevent accidental clicks.

Monitor Your Accounts: Keep an eye on your financial and online accounts for any unusual activity. If you suspect your information has been compromised, take immediate action to secure your accounts.

Counting Change By Harry Woodstrom (Finance Officer)

Counting change is a fundamental skill that everyone should have. A devise is now always available to give to the correct change. Here's a step-by-step guide to help you count change accurately and efficiently.

1. Start with the Smallest Denomination

When counting change, begin with the smallest denomination and work your way up. This method ensures accuracy and helps you keep track of the total amount. For example, if the total purchase is \$12.48 and the customer gives you \$20, start by counting up from \$12.48.

2. Count Up to the Nearest Dollar

First, count the change needed to reach the next whole dollar. In our example, you would add 2¢ to reach \$12.50. Then, add 50¢ to reach \$13.00.

3. Add Whole Dollars

Next, add whole dollars until you reach the amount given by the customer. From \$13.00, you would add \$7.00 to reach \$20.00.

4. Verify Your Count

Always double-check your count before handing the change to the customer. Count the change back to the customer, starting from the purchase amount and working up to the amount they gave you. This step ensures both you and the customer are confident in the transaction.

5. Be Patient and Calm

Counting change can sometimes be stressful, especially in a busy environment like the fireworks stand. Stay calm, take your time, and focus on accuracy. Your confidence will grow with experience.
