The Time I made a Green Beret M.P. Cuss.

One day many years ago a Green Beret M.P. Sergeant walked into my place of business in his Class A uniform. Which brought back memories for me since I was an E-5 like him when assigned to the old 202nd M.P. Battalion while serving in the Texas State Guard. Business was slow so we struck up a conversation.

I was expressing my great respect for his service as a combat veteran being a cold war/non-combat veteran myself. I was half joking about how hard it was to receive medals during my time, because it was peace time. I remember telling him, how one time they got so desperate they gave me a medal for standing in a circle. LOL ! As you can imagine he wasn't going to let that go unchallenged, so he asked me "Come on Sarge how do you get a medal for standing in a circle ? I replied, well the Vice President of the United States was in the middle of the circle. Then he said a bunch of colorful Green Beret things and continued " I knew you were holding out on me! Executive protection detail ! I'd give both my deployments for executive protection detail ! You must have been some kind of soldier they don't send just anybody on something like that."

THE BACKSTORY:

In April of 1986 Texas was hosting it's official sesquicentennial celebration (150th anniversary) at the San Jacinto Battleground. That day, my unit and I were tasked with crowd control and traffic control for the large event. Earlier in the day I was relieved from my traffic control point because a major from battalion, decided I was getting too sunburned and dehydrated. So I was sent to our command post, which was a large air conditioned tent down by the monument. I had been there for a couple of hours undergoing what firefighters would call re-hab when an unexpected call came in. It was from the Uniformed Division of the U.S. Secret Service. Apparently they had only brought 6 or 8 men from Washington D.C. To seal off the San Jacinto Monument and sweep it for explosives etc. before Vice President Bush's speech that evening. On arriving they of course quickly determined that would not be nearly enough. So they reached out to my unit and other agencies for augmentation. One of our officers asked me to participate. So I along with others in my unit, some state park rangers, and local law enforcement were tasked with creating a perimeter for the Secret Service while they secured the monument for the vice president.

Later that year I was awarded the Adjutant General's Individual Award (Texas,) for my actions that day protecting Vice President Bush, along with tens of thousands of other people.

American Legion Post 164 in Katy Celebrates Grand Reopening After Year-Long Displacement

After a year-long closure, the American Legion Jonathan D. Rozier Post No. 164 in Katy will open its doors once more for a grand reopening on Saturday, September 14, 2024. The post had been displaced from its location due to a failed Harris County Fire Marshall's inspection following the discovery that proper permitting had not been done on the building while occupied by the previous tenant. During this temporary closure, members of the post worked diligently to bring the facility up to standard. The refurbishments included thorough cleanup, pressure washing of the exterior, and a fresh repaint of all parking lot striping. Fundraising efforts such as a fireworks stand and bingo license proceeds provided the essential funds for the restoration work.

Sandy Krum, Commander of the Jonathan D. Rozier American Legion Post 164, underscored the importance of the grand reopening. "This event symbolizes our unwavering commitment to our community and our veterans. We are proud to be part of the neighborhood once again." Chartered by Congress in 1919, the American Legion serves as a patriotic veteran service organization. Post 164, chartered in November 2001 and relocated to its current site in 2022, is named in honor of Jonathan D. Rozier, a Katy veteran who paid the ultimate price during Operation Desert Storm. His heroic actions during the Battle of South Al Hillah were honored with a Bronze Star for Valor. Today, the post boasts a membership of 375 service members from all branches of the military.

Krum has been a dedicated member for nine years, driven by a strong desire to give back to fellow veterans and the community. With over 22 years of service in the U.S. Air Force and the Texas Air National Guard, Krum values the camaraderie and connection with fellow service members, ensuring that the spirit of unity continues within the post. His commitment to service and community reflects the core values of the American Legion, making a positive impact on the lives of those around him.

Under Krum's leadership, the American Legion Post 164 actively engages with the Katy community through various events and programs aimed at honoring veterans and fostering community spirit. Partnering with local organizations like VFW Post 9182 and the Tri County Military Order of the Purple Heart, they participate in events such as the Katy FFA Rodeo Parade, Memorial Day ceremonies, and Veterans Day activities. Unique to Post 164 are the annual Flag Retirement Ceremony, and the American Legion Boys State Program, which selects high school juniors to attend a leadership program at the University of Texas, Austin. As part of the grand reopening, the American Legion Post 164 plans to host an open house from 12:00 PM to 5:00 PM, with the official opening ceremony slated for 3:00 PM. Through this event, the Post aims to exhibit its ongoing commitment to serving veterans, their families, and the larger Katy community. With the reopening, the post will once again provide space for community activities such as the West Memorial Neighborhood Trunk or Treat, host blood drives, and potentially serve as a voting polling location.

The American Legion continues to be a bedrock of patriotic service and support for our nation's veterans. With a global membership exceeding 2.4 million across 14,000 posts, the organization is committed to mentoring youth, advocating patriotism, promoting national security, and supporting those who have served. 1. Sign in to your MyLegion account. If you do not have one, see below how to register for free.
2. Click on the red MY ACCOUNT box in the upper righthand corner.
3. Click on Membership Card in the lefthand gray box under the MEMBERSHIP category.
4. Click on the blue highlighted VIEW MEMBERSHIP CARD


The membership card will pop up and you will be able to save it to your desktop or on a flash drive, or print it out by utilizing the icon options in the upper righthand corner.

Register a MyLegion account

1. Go to MyLegion.org and click on Register in the upper right-hand corner
3. Enter your email in the Register window and click Next. A Verify Account window opens. Leave this page open. Go to your email and retrieve the OTP (One Time Password).
4. Enter the OTP and click Verify.
5. Create your password in the welcome window (your password must include an uppercase, lowercase, number and symbol, and there's an eight-character minimum)
6. Go to My Account to view your membership details.

THE STORY OF ARMY DRUMMER WILLIE JOHNSTON

One of life's inescapable truths is that we must all face the music.

For Willie Johnston, that fateful encounter began in 1861. His father, William Johnston, enlisted in the US Army in Vermont, and Willie begged to go with him. At 11 years old, it was risky. Yet according to historians, about 20% of Civil War soldiers who enlisted — both US Army and Confederate — were 18 years or younger. Willie somehow persuaded his father or the commanding officer that he was fit for the Army, and he became a drummer in D Company of the 3rd Vermont Volunteer Infantry Regiment.

Traditionally, many young boys served in the military as drummers. They were responsible for signaling commands during the chaos of battle or in the calm that followed. Different tunes had different beats, or “drum calls,” that alerted soldiers to their orders. According to *Drum* magazine, “‘Three Camps’ was reveille, ‘Tattoo’ meant bedtime, ‘Commence Firing,’

‘Quick Step,’ ‘Advance,’ and ‘Retreat’ were all part of the repertoire of the well-trained drummer boy.”

MARCHING TO HIS OWN BEAT

Willie's biggest performance came during the Seven Days Battles between June 25 and July 1, 1862. The US Army, commanded by General George B. McClellan, valiantly fought to invade Richmond, Virginia, as part of the Peninsula Campaign. But the troops were driven back by Confederate forces.

As US Army soldiers retreated, they began a 12-mile march to safety — an Army base at Harrison's Landing. They were exhausted, wet from heavy rains, and chilled to the bone. The march became a merciless battle through muck and mud. Many soldiers left weapons and equipment behind to lighten their knapsacks and keep moving. Of the 133 drummers in his division, only 11-year-old Willie marched into Harrison's Landing with his drum still intact.

Willie's physical effort and mental fortitude were quickly recognized and he was asked to play for the entire division. His tireless work of inspiring the troops through his constant, steady drumming earned him widespread respect and appreciation among his peers. In fact, Willie's drum beats reverberated all the way to Washington, D.C., where President Abraham Lincoln recommended he receive the Medal of Honor, which had just been newly enacted by law.

DRUMMING UP COURAGE

Just 13 years old, Willie received the Medal from War Secretary Edwin Stanton on September 16, 1863. His bold character and exemplary leadership, despite the wretched conditions and physical turmoil, became musical legend. He remains the youngest person to ever earn the Medal of Honor in the United States Armed Forces



PROPER WEARING OF THE LEGION CAP

From the Department of Texas Administrative Manual.

The Legion Cap should be worn by its members, only when in attendance at official Legion meetings or ceremonies, or as official guests at patriotic or other civil functions, or by individuals when officially representing The American Legion on public occasions.

A Legionnaire is considered to be in uniform when wearing the Legion Cap. Therefore, it is not proper to wear the Legion cap when eating a meal at any function.

Legionnaires not in formation will uncover when entering a church and shall remain uncovered during the entire service and will re-cover after leaving the church.

Restrictions on wearing the cap: The left side (emblem side) of any Legion cap CANNOT contain anything other than the Official American Legion emblem, and lettering as set forth as designated by The American Legion. NO DECORATIONS.

Consecutive membership insignia, membership stars, life emblem, leadership emblems, extension course insignia and/or decorations (authorized American Legion or military service), past or present officer insignia or badges must be worn on the right side of the cap in an orderly manner. Fraternal or civic organizational insignia, names or nicknames of individuals cannot be used on the American Legion cap.
